Things are relatively quiet at this time.

Folks from the Prosecutor's office continue to work with our Police department to create efficiencies and clean up processes. In cooperation with the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association (PBA), "Coffee with A Cop" was held at CocoLuxe giving a chance for the public to interact with our policemen. "Cocoa with A Cop" was also held at Caesar's.

Special Officer Potts will be at the Bedwell school to teach classes to students. By all accounts, this is a task that he's well suited for and I hope we receive positive feedback from the school, parents, and children.

We began an initiative several months ago asking residents on Holland Avenue, Maple Street, Willow Avenue, Prospect Street and Tainter Street if they are interested in having PSE&G install gas mains in those streets. This is a complicated job for two reasons. 1. We will be paving Willow Avenue this year and the town has an ordinance forbidding an opening of a newly-paved street for five years. 2. The NJ Board of Public Utilities permits a gas utility to split their operations into two separate functions: transmission and supply. As a result, installation of mains now costs money to residents, the amount depending on how many residents are willing to participate.

In order to help affected residents, we had a public informational meeting at town hall on February 13th with PSE&G present to answer questions. It is my understanding that residents can also fill out applications for gas service to their home at that meeting.

We managed to get some ice skating at the park during an extended period of cold weather. We now have a process in place where the Borough Administrator, working with the DPW and emergency services will make the decision to open the pond for skating. At least 5 inches of ice is required.

Our shared services are all functioning smoothly at this time and we will continue to explore other opportunities where it makes sense to our town.

We will be watching closely those actions affecting our municipality particularly in the areas of arbitration of employee disputes, pensions, and DEP. Among other areas, these probably could have the largest impact on the expense side of our ledger.

Participating in your government is certainly interesting, possibly (dare I say) fun. Please think about your involvement.



#### Academic & Continuing Education Scholarship Applications

Applications for the 2018 Peapack-Gladstone Woman's Club Academic Scholarships will be available at the Peapack-Gladstone Library, local high schools and from the Club Scholarship Chairman Christy Ndem (csndm@aol.com) beginning in March.

#### Women's Club

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Interested students must complete the application and mail it to the Peapack-Gladstone Woman's Club Academic Scholarship Award Program, PO Box 618, Peapack, NJ 07977 along with a current high school transcript of grades. The application must be postmarked no later than May 1st.

Applicants for the Peapack-Gladstone Woman's Club Academic Scholarship Program must be:

•Dependent children of full-time Peapack-Gladstone residents or members of the Peapack-Gladstone Woman's Club. The scholarship award covers naturally or legally adopted children and stepchildren living with the resident for six months or more during the twelve months preceding the date of initial application and each renewal. (A child boarding at school is considered to be living with the resident.)

•High school seniors or high school graduates planning to enroll for the first time in a full-time course of study leading to a baccalaureate degree at a regionally accredited four-year college or university; an associate degree at a regionally accredited two-year junior or community college in the U.S.; or post-high school trade school. (Recipients are expected to enroll in a full-time undergraduate course of study no later than the Fall following graduation.)

•Students who have achieved a cumulative minimum high school grade point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale.

The Woman's Club also offers a scholarship to adult women returning to school in the form of a Continuing Education Scholarship. If you are interested in applying, contact the Scholarship Chairman.

# Are you curious why there are lots of blue tubes in Rockabye Meadow?

Below is an article by Sandy Perry that was posted on Raritan Headwaters' webpage that explains their importance as part of the tree planting project that took place in October of 2017.

"The Peapack Brook is becoming better habitat for trout and other aquatic life, thanks to a tree planting project at the Rockabye Meadow Preserve – a cooperative effort between the borough Environmental Commission and local watershed watchdog Raritan Headwaters.

About 50 volunteers pitched in to plant 350 native New Jersey trees and shrubs over the course of three days in October. Raritan Headwaters and the Environmental Commission were joined by staff from the Peapack-Gladstone public works department, NJ Water Supply Authority, and local volunteers.

"Planting trees along our rivers and streams is one of the top ways we can have a direct impact in improving water quality," said Dr. Kristi MacDonald, science director of Raritan Headwaters.

Raritan Headwaters purchased the trees and shrubs through a "Roots for Rivers" grant from The Nature Conservancy to restore riparian buffers. Riparian buffers are the trees, shrubs, and grasses along waterways that help protect water quality. These buffers filter pollutants, improve streambank stability, and reduce erosion and flooding. The trees' foliage also shades the water during the heat of summer, keeping water temperatures cool enough for trout and other species that don't thrive in overheated streams.

One of the organizers of the project was Andrew Goode, a longtime Raritan Headwaters volunteer who lives in the borough park neighborhood. Andrew offered to approach the Environmental Commission and Borough Council on behalf of RHA to see if they were interested in the project.



"They were so enthusiastic about the whole project and are eager for it to continue downstream," Andrew said.

John Kappler, Chair of the Borough Environmental

Commission and a lead on the project, also organizes the annual RHA Stream Cleanup at the Preserve. He expressed his gratitude for all the hard work that went into the planting. "Hats off to all our valued volunteers' efforts, which will provide a dramatic enhancement to Rockabye Meadow and the Peapack Brook for generations."

Members of Delbarton School's Angler's Club also helped out. "We explained to the students why we wanted to do this project and they were very enthusiastic," said Andrew. "This will actually help their fishing in the future." Neighboring Bedminster Township's generous loan of a large augur to bore holes for the bigger trees and shrubs alleviated the need to dig them by hand, an incredibly labor intensive effort. "The volunteers practically planted a miniature forest overnight, thanks to the help of Tom Skillman from the borough DPW and his skills using the auger," says Kristi.

The trees and shrubs planted included a variety of oaks, blackgum, silver maple, sweetgum, river birch, black cherry, witch hazel, pussy willow and smooth alder. Plastic tubes were placed around their trunks to keep them from being browsed by deer and small mammals.
