
Thank you for permitting me to serve; it was my honor. I'm certain that our local government will function quite nicely in the future.

PG PROFILE: BEVERLY COOPER TIGER Provided by the PG Historic Preservation Commission

Beverly Cooper Tiger lives in a beautiful remodeled "chicken coop" on part of the old Mosle estate. She shares her home with her husband, Ken, and two champion standard poodles. AKC ribbons adorn the walls of her house, and an elaborate maze of agility jumps and training obstacles decorates her yard. She has lived here since she was married; before that, she lived in a house on Old Chester Road.

Beverly's memories of growing up in Peapack-Gladstone in the 1940s evoke a different time. "There were no mothers hanging around," she says. "We were free to do what we wanted; our parents knew one another, and essentially knew where were and what we were up to. In the summer, we stayed out until dark, or until we were called home. It was just a whole different life, more like Andy Griffith."

During her school years, Beverly attended the Peapack-Gladstone School through eighth grade, followed by high school at Mt. St. John Academy. Her Junior Prom date, Ken Tiger of Chester, eventually became her husband. Ken also worked for a time for Beverly's father, Michael Cooper, then owner of the Gladstone Market and also a member of the PG Boro Council.

At the time, the Gladstone Market was primarily a butcher and grocery shop. Beverly's father would deliver goods to residences all over Peapack-Gladstone, including Blairsden Estate. Beverly remembers accompanying her father on these deliveries, going inside the gates of Blairsden and seeing the property's indoor courts and swimming pool. Beverly's family has other connections to Blairsden as well: her grandfather had been a gardener

there, responsible for maintaining the fountains and plantings on the estate. In winter, Beverly remembers sledding behind the houses on Old Chester road, along the coal chutes where Rockabye Meadow is today. "There was a tall mound of dirt, and when it snowed we would climb up to the top of the mound to start down. Sometimes the area would flood and freeze. If there was ice, then you could really fly."

In the early 1940s, a large flood inundated the Gladstone Market with nearly two feet of standing water (a photograph of the flood still hangs in the Gladstone Market today). At the time, the market was smaller than it is today. An insurance agency occupied the space where the dining room exists today. Some of the surrounding businesses still exist today. The Gladstone post office was there. "You would go to the post office and meet people you knew every day," says Beverly. Next to the post office was her uncle Pat's barber shop, where townspeople-including local law enforcement--might go for a haircut, and sometimes, a game of poker in the back!

Beverly and Ken have two sons, Mike and Tim. Their older son, Mike, attended the Peapack-Gladstone School through second grade, until it closed. Tim, their younger son, is a graduate of West Point. Both boys attended Bernards High School. Over the years, Beverly and Ken have been active residents, and Beverly has served on the PG Historic Preservation Commission. They still maintain their post office box in Gladstone--the same box used by Beverly's father when he owned the Gladstone Market. Keep your eye out, and you may meet them at the post office one day, or notice them walking one of their beautiful standard poodles down the street!

PG PROFILE: SUSAN WOLFE GEAREY Provided by the PG Historic Preservation Commission

Susan Wolfe Gearey was born on September 29th, 1958 at Morristown Memorial Hospital. Her parents, L. Edmond and Clara Wolfe, lived in a house on Main Street in Peapack that was built by Bernardsville builder Ed Croot. Susan lived with her parents and three siblings at the Peapack house until the family built a larger home at 15 Jackson Avenue in Gladstone. Susan's oldest memory of

living in Peapack-Gladstone is of sitting the front lawn of her Peapack house on the day her family moved to Gladstone. She was four years old.

Susan's mother Clara was a "domestic engineer," with four children and an active presence in the community. She was a Girl Scout leader (the Girl Scouts at the time

met at the Sara Kay Memorial Building or in the basement of St. Luke's), a Sunday School teacher, and a choir director at the Gladstone Methodist Church. Later, when Susan and her siblings were older, Clara managed the bookstore at Gill St. Bernards School.

Susan's father Edmond worked in insurance and later at Komline Sanderson. He was one of the "founding fathers" of the Somerset County College (now Raritan Valley Community College), where he was the Director of Budget and Finance. He also sat on the board of Revere Savings and Loan (which later became Roselle Savings Bank) for 37 years. While a resident of Peapack-Gladstone, Edmond also served as tax assessor for the town, member of the Borough Council, and mayor (two terms). In 1974, he established the Frank J. Gallo Memorial Scholarship Fund in honor of the late police chief. He was a member of the PG Public Assistance Board and the American Legion Post 216, and for 22 years he conducted Peapack-Gladstone's Memorial Day services.

Growing up in Peapack-Gladstone, Susan and her siblings went to the Peapack-Gladstone school through eighth grade, then took the train to Bernards High School. "Our classes at PG had about 24 children," Susan says. "We knew each other really well. Our parents were close as well. It was a very connected community. We walked to and from school and to and from the train station every day. It was rare to be driven anywhere; we either walked or rode our bikes."

Some of Susan's favorite things to do growing up in Peapack-Gladstone were going to Little League games, walking around town with friends, riding bikes in town, and going to Howland's Corner (now Cesar's Deli) to buy penny candy and a Coke from the big cooler at the back of the store. Susan adds, "We would stop on our way home from school at the garage now known as The Stable and buy a bottle of soda for ten cents from the machine at the entrance. We would go to Debus Rexall Drug Store in Peapack to buy comic books--I can still remember the smell of the store. We would go to the Copper Kettle [now Cocoluxe], buy a pickle, and walk around town eating it. Our parents would buy appliances from Alex Cassel's store [now the hair salon]. There were "coffee houses" held at Wesley Hall by the Methodist Church. These were gatherings for mostly young people where music was played and soft drinks and snacks were served. It was a great place to hang out and stay out of trouble. I also remember all of the kids being organized for the first Earth Day. We walked all over town picking up trash, and then had a party at the Sara Kay Memorial building, with

food and a band. In the winter, skating at the pond was a big social activity. Lights were set up so we could skate at night. We would have a small bonfire on the island and moms would make us hot chocolate. We would go sledding behind our house or on Sheep Hill off Mendham Road.

"In the summer, we all [participated in the town recreation program] at the school and played 'knock hockey' and made potholders and trivets out of tiles. We would play four-square and wall ball for hours. I ended up being a counselor there when I was older. We swam in a lake up in Flanders called 'The Tarn.' Some residents were members of the swim club at Chester Springs. Yes, the ShopRite used to be a pool club! Across the street from the swim club was a wonderful flea market that was open every Sunday."

Susan also remembers running up and down the ramps at the Peapack-Gladstone School, in spite of the teachers' commands of "no running in the halls! Walk! Walk!" Liberty Park is also featured in Susan's memories of childhood. If the weather was cold enough, Susan and her classmates would ice skate on the pond for gym class. She also remembers her father performing wedding services at the park while he was mayor. Some things weren't so different from today: Susan's family went to the Post Office to collect the mail. Other services have disappeared: "Archie Beiser delivered bread to our house, and we had our milk delivered as well. We still have our milk box on our porch!"

Town traditions like the live Nativity (started by the Methodist Church) and the Halloween parade at the school gym were beloved. About the Halloween parade, Susan remembers, "The town would have one of the Dads dress up in a clown costume and we had to guess who it was. If you guessed correctly, you won a prize. That's how well we all knew each other; children knew all of their classmates' dads."

When Susan was growing up in PG, it was a country town. Fields that today are developed with houses were populated by Black Angus cows. "Tiger Hill was 'Tiger's hill,' and was just a big cornfield with a spring house. We weren't supposed to go in there, but of course we did."

Susan is grateful to live in a town that values the importance of retaining its character, where neighbors are friendly and supportive. "We have an annual block party that helps to keep us connected," Susan says. "All in all, it remains a great town in which to live."

PG PROFILE: RITA ELLEN MOORE SERDAKOWSKI Provided by the PG Historic Preservation Commission

Ríta Serdakowskí has made hundreds of quilts since 1975. Her house is filled with heirloom-quality pieces that she makes for family and friends. The quilts are colorful and intricate: one quilt, made up of tiny scraps sewn into triangles, took her three years to complete; another is delicately embroidered to highlight flower parts and leaf patterns; yet another pieces together squares with personal messages written to Rita upon her retirement from St. Barnabas Hospital, where she worked as a nurse for 40 years.

Rita lives in the same house in Gladstone that she moved to with her family in 1930, when she was just six weeks old. The house, built in 1900, had indoor plumbing (the old outhouse was removed from the yard) and was heated by a coal furnace (later replaced with baseboard heat). In the backyard, there was a grape arbor and a chicken coop. Beyond the house was a vast expanse of farmland. Today, that farmland has disappeared, replaced by houses.

Growing up in Gladstone, Rita has fond memories of picking strawberries and wild asparagus in summer and ice skating at Liberty Park with her sisters, Wanda

and Joan in the winter. Rita remembers, "Each year, on Christmas Eve, our father would get our Christmas tree from the Peapack Reformed Church." She has old photographs of a large pine tree in the front of her house, nicknamed the Christmas Tree, that in later years her family decorated with lights during the holidays. Some of Rita's childhood memories are more somber. She remembers looking out an upstairs window at a black mourning wreath on her grandmother's

door. She also recalls a rainy day when she left her doll outside on the swing by the grape arbor. "It rained," she says, "and when I went back outside to get it, the doll's head was ruined." She was around six years old at the time.

Rita is the daughter of Julia Hoydich Moore and Andrew "Budd" Moore. Her father,

Budd, grew up in Gladstone and was a fifth-generation New Jerseyan (his parents were Lizzie Hoffman Moore and William Moore). He worked at a buckle factory in Newark, which he saved from a devastating fire started by a burning wastebasket. Budd carried the wastebasket out of the building himself, suffering severe burns as a result. He spent months at St. Barnabas Hospital recovering, and Rita remembers visiting him there as a young child. Years later, as a nurse at St. Barnabas, her memories of her father's hospital time were still vivid. "I remembered the exact room where my father had stayed," she says. To this day, Rita believes that the buckle factory owner, in gratitude for her father's heroism, provided the private nurse during her father's recovery as well as the house where her family vacationed each summer at the Jersey shore.

In 1953, Rita married Stanley Serdakowski at the Evangel Baptist Church in Newark. The couple livedin Newark before moving back to her family home in Gladstone in 1967. Over the years, the house she grew up in has undergone several renovations: doors were removed, the heating modernized, and a baby nursery converted to a master bathroom. Today, the house is filled with photographs, Rita's well-tended houseplants (a tree dates from the 1964 New York World's Fair; a tall snake plant from the 1930s), and of course, quilts!

Women Aware is a domestic violence agency. As you can imagine, it is particularly difficult for these women and children to be in the Safe House during the holidays. Won't you help us make their holidays a little brighter?

CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates for Children) is our NJ State Federation of Women's Clubs special state project for 2018 and 2019. It is a nonprofit organization that recruits and trains community volunteers who advocate for children removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect – ultimately to make sure they are safe, and they receive services they need within the court and child welfare systems. These CASA volunteers are the eyes and ears of the court in the community. There are currently 11,000 children across the state who have been removed from their homes - only one-third have a CASA advocate. The collected items will be donated to CASA of Somerset, Warren and Hunterdon (CASA SHAW) for distribution to children who often leave home with very few belongings.
